





Preface

I am delighted to be writing this foreword for the **Creative Collaborations Grant Programme 2022-2025 Project Report**.

In the years 2022 to 2025, the British Council in Türkiye has managed a grant scheme that brought together creatives in Türkiye and the UK into collaborative partnerships that resulted in artistic projects or programmes. Over a three-year period, we received over 269 applications. The competition was fierce, and it was challenging to select the grantees. Altogether, 34 organisations from across Türkiye and the UK collaborated, producing new and innovative work, expanding artistic output, building audiences, breaking boundaries, and we trust creating lasting friendships between our two countries.

In this report we want to recognise and celebrate the achievements of the collaborative partnerships and to acknowledge the tremendous talent and commitment. We also want to draw attention to the opportunities that exist in Türkiye for creative partnerships, and to raise awareness among UK artists and creative institutions who may not have considered working with Türkiye before.

The projects and programmes range across all creative disciplines, from drama and dance, to music and literature, to film and publishing, visual and performative arts. We also wanted to reach out to different parts of the country, and to emphasise the importance of mutual benefit, community impacts, diversity of audiences, equality of opportunity, accessibility and sustainability.

We are all very proud of these projects, and others that are still ongoing. Whilst the Türkiye country-specific Creative Collaborations grant scheme has now drawn to a close, we are pleased that it lives on in a region-wide scheme 'Connections Through Culture Grants' I hope you will enjoy this publication and feel inspired to make new connections as well as maintain those that are already established between Türkiye and the UK, building trust and understanding, and lasting friendship.

Introduction

For three years, the Creative Collaborations Grant Programme has fostered dynamic partnerships between Türkiye and the UK, transforming shared ideas into meaningful shared experiences. Spanning three successful editions, the programme has created an extensive network of cultural exchange, with 37 projects connecting 34 institutions from Türkiye with 27 from the UK and engaging 30 artists in collaborative creative ventures.

The impact of these collaborations has been remarkable, reaching over 65,000 people through projects implemented across 20 cities, and generating more than 3,5 million digital views. This report has been meticulously prepared through direct communication with all partners, incorporating responses from 29 institutions. The grant call aimed to welcome project collaborations that tackle inclusive global themes of ecology, gender equality, accessibility and diversity through different art forms such as visual arts, creative technologies, film, music, literature, theatre and dance aiming to share and disseminate the understanding of culture and arts in the UK and Türkiye to be exhibited online or face-to-face.

The primary objectives of this report are twofold: to enhance the visibility of the projects and partnerships supported under the programme, and to share valuable insights with stakeholders in the UK to facilitate and inspire future creative collaborations between Türkiye and the United Kingdom.

It prepares students for the industry with theoretical and practical courses, and develops innovative projects in the fields of cinema, television, and new media.

Example of an International Collaboration

Reel Borders, of which Çukurova University is a partner, is a five-year (2021-2026) research project focusing on the relationship between cinema and borders. As part of the project, which deals with borders not only geographically but also in the context of identity, migration, and belongingness, participatory film workshops were held in Adana. The workshops brought together university students and Syrian youth, and four short films were screened at the Adana Golden Boll (Altın Koza)Film Festival.



Suppliants of Syria was implemented in collaboration with Çukurova University, Border Crossings Theatre Company, and Meryem Women's Cooperative.

The project merged theatre and documentary by combining Aeschylus' Suppliants with the experiences of Syrian refugee women. Started in 2023 in Adana, the project was completed with artists in London and presented to the audience in Tunisia and Adana.

The screenings brought art and academia together, creating a strong interaction environment on migration and gender issues.

Aks Creative Hub

Organisation Details

Aks Creative Hub is a cultural organisation established in Ankara in 2019, developing interdisciplinary projects in the fields of creative industries, design, architecture and urban planning. It focuses specifically on design thinking and participatory urbanism as a platform supporting young professionals. Aks is a member of the European Creative Hubs Network and the New European Bauhaus Community, and produces sustainable urbanisation solutions through international collaborations and innovative projects.

Example of an International Collaboration

Aks Creative carried out a placemaking/tactical urbanism project focusing on the transformation of a theatre building in Augsburg, Germany in autumn 2023. In the process carried out under the titles TALK IT, WALK IT, DREAM IT and DISCUSS IT, ideas were collected from the local community and opened to evaluation through participatory methods. Based on the collected data, a placemaking report was prepared in coordination with the municipality and user-oriented, inclusive spatial transformation proposals were developed. After 10 days of field implementation, the project was successfully completed.



Aks+Future, Aks Association's sub-team working in the field of game design, develops playable interfaces that encourage critical thinking in this field by producing fictional worlds and scenarios about the future. UrbanJam, an interdisciplinary event with the theme of 'the future of cities', was held on 11-15 January 2023 in Ankara. Around 65 participants from various disciplines such as architecture, design, computer engineering and software development generated game ideas focusing on urban utopias. UrbanJam was the first urbanism-themed game jam in Türkiye and Europe.

Ankara State Opera and Ballet Modern Dance Ensemble (MDT)

Organisation Details

Ankara State Opera and Ballet Modern Dance Ensemble (MDT) is one of the longest established public art institutions producing contemporary dance in Türkiye. In 1970, it was detached from the State Theatres and became an independent organisation. MDT has pioneered the development of modern dance in Türkiye, staging both classical and contemporary dance repertoire and has also collaborated with international choreographers. Adopting interdisciplinary approaches in its artistic productions, MDT has the capacity to produce together with its own stage design, costume, lighting and technical teams.

Fields of Activity

- Performance arts (contemporary dance, stage shows)
- National and international dance projects
- Art education, children and youth workshops

Structural Model

MDT is a public art institution affiliated to the Ministry of Culture and Tourism. Its income generation model is mainly based on the state budget and box office revenues.

Annual Average Number of Visitors: 220,000

Visitor Profile

MDT's activities appeal to a wide range of audiences, especially those seeking classical ballet and contemporary dance shows. Its audience includes art students, academics, art-loving adults and children. Its shows attract great interest especially from those who closely follow the cultural calendar in Ankara.

Accessibility

- Handicapped ramps and lift systems for physical access
- Captioned performances for the hearing impaired
- Special dance performances and backstage tours for children

Example of an International Collaboration

'AMBIVALANCE', which premiered in May 2025, is a two-act contemporary dance project. The first part of the project, Kuğu (Swan), is choreographed by Guido Markowitz, a choreographer invited from Germany, and composed by Fabian Shulz. The second part will be Çatı (Roof) by MDT dancer and choreographer Deniz Alp, with original music composed by Galip Emre. The show aims to support the joint choreographic production processes of artists from different countries.





Human, a contemporary dance work premiered on 18 January 2025 in Ankara was an interdisciplinary project staged by MDT. Choreographed by James Sutherland with music by Davidson Jaconello, the work focused on the different states of being human. With the contributions of Fine Arts Folk Music and State Theatre artists, this new music added both local elements and a universal language to the show, complementing the dance performance on the stage.

The project offered a multi-layered experience to the audience with the holistic use of dance, sound, light and stage design, and has carried MDT's production capacity in contemporary performing arts to the international arena.

Example of an International Collaboration

As part of the project 'Good Practice Techniques in Music Education for Young People with Autism (OGME)' is a guide as well as online resources and training programmes for music education of individuals with autism are being developed together with partner institutions from Türkiye, Romania, Bulgaria and Italy. The project is planned to be completed by the end of 2025.












The 1st International Barrier-Free Music Festival held on 17-18 May 2023 in Ankara, brought together 22 musicians with special needs from Türkiye and the United Kingdom. The guest artist of the festival was Oluwademiladeayomideasani Adeagbo, a young musician with autism from the UK. In the two-day festival organised at Mamak Musiki Muallim Mektebi and CSO ADA Ankara, concerts, workshops, and panels were held, and musicians with special needs performed with the University Chamber Orchestra. An online workshop was held before the festival, where families, academics, and trainers shared their experiences.

Flying Broom Foundation

Organisation Details

The Flying Broom Foundation is a feminist organisation based in Ankara that aims to establish lasting collaborations between women+ organisations in Türkiye and internationally, make women's stories visible, and advocate for gender equality. The Foundation stands out with its network of local women reporters, projects to combat early marriages, feminist journalism, and awareness-raising through the arts. One of its most well-known projects is the Flying Broom International Women's Film Festival, which has been organised for 28 years and is the first of its kind in Türkiye.

Flying Broom is an independent non-profit foundation working in the fields of women+rights and gender equality.

Visitor Profile

The majority of visitors are women. The film festival and other events bring together feminist activists, film students, representatives of women's NGOs, and female directors. Most of the participants are 20 to 45 years old.

- Subtitles, captions, and physical access facilities such as ramps at film screenings and talks
- Online content with a wide digital access network
- Multilingual public awareness campaigns and accessible visual materials

Example of an International Collaboration


The Flying Broom Foundation has established strong ties with international feminist networks in the field of gender equality. It contributed to CEDAW shadow report processes and took an active role in global women's movements such as the World March of Women. It also collaborates with film institutions and festival platforms from various European countries. Through these collaborations, it is ensured that the works of female directors in Türkiye go into international circulation and gender-based cinema debates are strengthened.



We Claim the Screen: Flying Broom Film Days event was held on 17-18 November 2024 at the Kült Kavaklıdere Cinema in Ankara. These special screenings included four British films that had not premiered in Türkiye, as well as a discussion on A Taste of Honey, one of the classics of British queer cinema.

The event aimed to support independent cinema, promote cultural exchange between the UK and Türkiye, and open up discussions on gender representations in the film industry.

Puruli Culture and Arts

Organisation Details

Puruli Culture and Arts is a non-governmental organisation based in Ankara that aims to enable individuals whose participation in the field of culture and arts is limited due to physical, economic, or social barriers to participate in cultural life on more equal terms. The Barrier-Free Films Festival, which has been organised since 2013, has become a pioneering model for the development of accessible cultural policy in Türkiye. Transferring the knowledge and experience gained through the festival to different projects, Puruli contributes to the formulation of cultural policies that advocate equal participation by developing collaborations with the film industry, public institutions and civil society.

Fields of Activity

- Cinema and accessible film screenings
- Cultural inclusion, accessibility and advocacy
- Workshops, festivals and policy development activities

Structural Model

Puruli Culture and Arts is a non-governmental organisation established to increase accessibility and participation in the field of culture and arts. It carries out its activities with grants, sponsorships, public and private sector support.

Year of Establishment: 2013

Scale: Medium-large

Annual Average Number of Visitors: 5,000+ (annual average of Barrier-Free Films Festival)

Visitor Profile

Event participants include film lovers, people with disabilities, students, cultural professionals and representatives of civil society working in the field of accessibility. All events, especially the Barrier-Free Film Festival, reach an inclusive audience profile of all ages and abilities.

Accessibility

- Audio description (AD) and closed captioning (CC) at all film screenings
- Sign language interpretation in dialogues
- Autism-friendly screenings
- Use of spaces with ramps, lifts, accessible WCs
- Presentation of materials in Braille, plain language and alternative text formats
- Web and social media accessibility
- Volunteer and staff training that observes the anti-ableism stance

Example of an International Collaboration

'Çekirdek Eskişehir' project aimed to establish a sustainable and inclusive cultural space in Eskişehir. In partnership with Eskişehir Metropolitan Municipality, the project aimed to transform a municipal property into an accessible and interdisciplinary arts space open to independent artists and cultural producers. The project contributed to inclusive space management models by bringing together national and international collaborations.



The 11th Barrier-Free Films Festival was held in Ankara on 20-26 October 2023, in Eskişehir on 4-5 November 2023, and on the online platform eff2023.muvi.com. A total of 42 films were screened at the festival, and 2,831 people participated in workshops and events.

The 'Fingerprint' section of the festival was dedicated to the British filmmaker Ken Loach. Kes, The Old Oak, and Raining Stones were screened in an accessible format.

The jury members of the International Short Film Competition were Çağlar Kimyoncu and Michael Achtman from the UK, both artists known for their accessible art practices. In addition, cinema professionals and volunteers worked together on creative access methods in the 'Creative Audio Description' workshop led by Michael Achtman.

Roof Coliving

Organisation Details

Roof Coliving is a civil society initiative based in Ankara, established to design common living spaces where individuals from different backgrounds and disciplines can live together and to develop a new culture of coexistence in these spaces. It considers space not only as a shelter but also as a common ground where community relations and participatory production flourish. It aims to build pluralistic, fair, and accessible forms of living through participatory methods against exclusionary and single-centred design approaches in cities. It promotes the meaningful participation of urban vulnerable groups, especially youth, women, LGBTI+ individuals, and migrants, in urban life.

Fields of Activity

- Participatory space design and placemaking
- Community-oriented audiovisual projects
- Culture and arts practices in public spaces
- Advocacy and policy development with local governments

Structural Model

Roof Coliving is a non-profit, non-governmental organisation. It ensures its financial sustainability through local and international project grants, urban and audiovisual project services

Year of Establishment: 2020

Scale: Medium

Annual Average Number of Visitors: 3,000+

Visitor Profile

Event participants come from different ages, professions, and socio-economic backgrounds. Although most of the participants are local communities at the neighbourhood scale, groups with low visibility in urban life, such as women, LGBTI+ individuals, and migrants, are also actively involved in the processes, thanks to Roof Coliving's approach.

Accessibility

- Accessibility principles (ramps, wide doors, WCs, baby care areas, etc.) are applied in space designs.
- Accessibility analyses of the venues are made before events.
- Online content is arranged to be screen reader compatible.
- Factors such as colour contrast and visual clarity are taken into account.
- Physical and cognitive barriers are mapped and solution processes are designed together with NGOs

Example of an International Collaboration

In the Mutual Learning through Shared Spaces project paired with Budapest-based ACRED, Roof Coliving developed a roadmap specific to the Turkish context by drawing on ACRED's experiences on community-based housing models. At the same time, Roof Coliving shared its own creative placemaking experience and conveyed its knowledge on generation of participatory solutions to spatial problems.

The project titled 'Yeryüzü Sineması' aimed to establish climate dialogue in public space through a pop-up cinema space on 22 June 2023 in Adana. A participatory production process was established between young citizens and local administrations. At the end of the project, the cinema space designed by the citizens was launched with climate-themed film screenings and workshops. Having transformed film-watching practices in the public space, the project presented a creative interaction model by bringing together the field of culture and arts and climate activism.

Çanakkale

Çanakkale Biennial - Troya Cultural Association

Organisation Details

CABININ is an initiative that organises the International Çanakkale Biennial. Founded in 2012, the organisation operates under Troya Cultural Association and aims to position Çanakkale as a city of culture at national and international level by focusing on different forms and disciplines of contemporary art. It focuses on improving access to culture for different segments of society, inter-communal dialogue, and co-production culture through art

Fields of Activity

- Visual arts
- International biennial organisation
- Accessibility, social inclusion and arts education
- Creative projects at the intersection of art and archaeology

Structural Model

The Çanakkale Biennial is run by the Troya Cultural Association, a non-profit civil society organisation. It carries out its activities through international cultural collaborations, project supports and sponsorships.

Year of Establishment: 2012

Scale: Large

Annual Average Number of Visitors: 95,000 in post-pandemic biennials; 2,645 active participants in the 2024 edition; 90,000 viewers reached



Visitor Profile

The majority of visitors are young people, women and cultural professionals. The Biennial has diversified demographics, given the migration from big cities to Çanakkale. In addition, special events and workshops are held for people with disabilities, children and students, paying attention to accessibility practices.

Accessibility

- Braille artwork labels
- Spaces that meet physical access requirements
- Special exhibition tours for individuals with hearing impairment and physical disabilities
- Content development for different groups such as individuals with autism and intellectual disability
- Collaborations with local CSOs and expert institutions on accessibility
- 'Biennial Barrier-Free' sub-programme aiming to raise awareness

Example of an International Collaboration

In the 2024 edition of the Biennial, Swedish curator Ulrika Flink and artist Eric Magassa made a new production. With the support of the Italian Cultural Centre, a collective publication inspired by the Trojan Horse was launched. In addition, the long-standing partnership with the Thessaloniki Biennale continued in 2024. Through these projects, the biennial has developed production-based relationships with contemporary art institutions in Europe.

David Blandy's 'Diachronic' tabletop role-playing game (TTRPG) project was launched in collaboration with the John Hansard Gallery (JHG) at the University of Southampton during the Çanakkale Biennale which was held from 4 October to 11 November. Produced with the contributions of the Troy Excavation Directorate, the Troy Foundation and the Troy Museum, the game was inspired by the Troy excavations, mythology and archaeology, offering players the opportunity to question the narratives established with the past.

The play was exhibited at the Korfmann Library during the biennial, reaching 90,000 people. In addition, 1,238 people experienced the play during the 10-day exhibition at MAHAL Sanat. As part of the project, David Blandy's video works were also exhibited, and the artist held workshops with Çanakkale Onsekiz Mart University students and game clubs. Accessible play sessions were held for individuals with hearing impairment and physical disabilities. At the end of the project, the CABININ team, representatives of the Troy Cultural Association and the JHG team organised a mutual cooperation tour of institutions and artists based in the UK and Çanakkale.

Wêjegeh Amed | Diyarbakır Literature House

Organisation Details

Wêjegeh Amed was founded in 2020 on the initiative of Lîs Publishing, which has long been active in the field of Kurdish publishing in Diyarbakır. The organisation is an open and participatory platform for multilingual and cross-border literary, artistic, and cultural activities. Centred on interdisciplinary studies, cultural pluralism, and the literary identities of underrepresented languages, Wêjegeh Amed creates an important space for Kurdish literature to meet with contemporary and international production.

Fields of Activity

- Kurdish, Turkish and multilingual literary events
- Literary meetings and publishing activities
- Cross-border writing projects
- Cultural collaborations and art projects

Structural Model

Wêjegeh Amed is an independent, non-profit cultural initiative operating under Lîs Publications. It carries out its activities through self-funding, local support and joint projects with international cultural organisations.

Year of Establishment: 2020

Scale: Small

Annual Average Number of Visitors: 3,000+ physical attendance; multilingual digital access through publications, panels and events

Visitor Profile

The events are mostly attended by writers, translators, literary researchers and young readers interested in Kurdish literature. In addition, collaborations are established with guest writers, academics and cultural activists from abroad, and community-based literary studies are supported.

Accessibility

- Spaces that comply with accessibility regulations
- Translation support and multilingual content
- Practices that facilitate digital access depending on participant profile

Example of an International Collaboration

Belongings is a two-year cross-border literary programme in partnership with the Sami Writers' House (Tjállegoahte -

Författarecentrum Sápmi) in Sweden. The project provided an environment for cultural and literary dialogue based on the common historical experiences of the Kurdish and Sami peoples. The project involved 5 Sami and 5 Kurdish writers, and following digital meetings, mutual site visits and creative writing activities, the trilingual anthology Belongings (in Sami, Kurdish and English) was published. Launch events were organised in Stockholm, Jokkmokk, Diyarbakır, Mardin and Van.



Since 2021, Wêjegeh Amed has been running the Literature Beyond Borders project in cooperation with the literary houses of Berlin, Oslo, İstanbul and Chernivtsi, organising international writer residencies and talks as well as offering special residencies for Kurdish writers. It also hosts authors in cooperation with the Turkish Publishers Association and the cultural representations of European countries in Türkiye.

The project, included a new edition of the Diyarbakır Comparative Literature Days. In this event, two artists from the United Kingdom held workshops and participated in artist talks for the local community in the residency programme in Diyarbakır and Mardin, between December 2024 and January 2025. A special exhibition was prepared for the residency programme, and the whole process was documented with original writings and published in a printed publication.

The programme, which was prepared for the fifth time with plans to organise it biennially, has expanded from local to international scale with support from Turkish and European institutions and through self-funding. Focusing on multilingual, thematic sessions, the international programme aims to ensure the equal representation of the cultural productions of different communities, observing the principle of democratic freedom of expression and independence.

The workshop was attended by approximately 100 women, including national and international artists, activists, researchers, and civil society representatives. In the programme, women's visibility in the field of culture and arts, Kurdish women's resistance experiences, and current debates on freedom of expression in Türkiye were discussed in three separate sessions, while methods of resistance in the field of culture and arts and suggestions for solutions were shared in the forum section.





Held between 29 September and 5 October 2024 in Diyarbakır, Amed SurFest was as a five-day festival organised to make the multilingual and multicultural heritage of the city visible and maintain its existence. In the festival, workshops for children, online panels, traditional clothing presentations, and concerts were organised.

The events were mainly held in Kurdish and Armenian languages in the historical locations of Diyarbakır.

The festival contributed to the preservation of cultural heritage by revitalising traditional practices that are about to disappear.

The festival was organised in collaboration with DB Music London from the United Kingdom, enabling different cultural identities to come together through art and music.

The oral history texts obtained were transformed into a theatre performance titled 'Sustular / Konuştular' and staged as part of the 5th Gazişehir Theatre Festival. During the project, theatre artists, academics and artists from Berlin and Gaziantep came together. 82 people directly participated in the event, which was followed by a total of 120 theatregoers in Gaziantep between 8 June and 13 October 2024.





'Devising to Break the Walls' workshop was held in Gaziantep between 16 and 20 October 2024 in collaboration with London-based Complicité Theatre.

The five-day free workshop focused on collective storytelling, staging methods, and body dramaturgy in theatre art. Based on the 'devising' technique, the workshop was presented through an open call to artists and theatre students interested in innovative forms of expression.

NEFES implemented the 'Gaziantep Art Space' project in cooperation with the Gaziantep Metropolitan Municipality Department of Culture, Arts and Science, as part of the 'In Partnership: Culture, Dialogue and Support Programme' conducted by the Istanbul Foundation for Culture and Arts (İKSV). Targeting children, youth, academics, artists and cultural activists, the project includes arts and music education, activities for the protection of cultural heritage and events aimed at strengthening social cohesion. In the project, nine concerts, six exhibitions and three theatre plays were staged. Moreover, workshops were held with international experts in nine different fields of art and culture. At least 100 students received arts education, and the activities reached more than 6.000 people. The project was supported by academic institutions such as King's College London, Kuwait Higher Institute of Music and İstanbul University Institute of Turkic Studies, which strengthened the quality of the project through expert visits, technical consultancy and regional collaborations.



NEFES brought together historical and contemporary perspectives on Ottoman, Turkish and Arabic musical heritage through the project titled 'The Art of Muvashshah and Classical Oral Forms of Intercultural Cooperation in Pan-Ottoman Music in the Early 20th Century'. In this context, it partnered with leading institutions such as King's College London, Oxford University, Oxford Maqam, Gaziantep University and İstanbul University. The project addressed the historical connections of Ottoman Arabic music, organising panels, concerts and workshops in the UK and Türkiye.

Under the guidance of Professor Martin Stokes, the collaboration aimed to revitalise cultural memory and pave the way for contemporary interpretations of classical music. The events were held in November 2023 and attended by 670 people and reached approximately ten thousand people through digital communication channels.

Example of an International Collaboration

AVTO x 0xSalon: Speculative Resistance and Non-Human Futures project, carried out with London-based artist and academic Wassim Alsindi, aimed to explore strategies of speculative, corporeal and non-human resistance through the role-playing card game FAUOX SALON. Based on a customised deck of cards inspired by the AVTO archive, the experience allowed participants to imagine the future through play, taking on perspectives outside their own belief systems. The project provided an experimental tool promoting political imagination and collective decision-making processes.





This research and conversation series titled 'Coasts - Part 1' by AVTO was held in İstanbul and İzmir, in 2023-24, coordinated by Meriç Öner, addressed the geographical and social transformations observed along Türkiye's coastline.

The project analysed coastal economies and climate-induced changes in agriculture, tourism and trade, combining disciplines such as social geography, ecology and urban planning.

In collaboration with Vessel (Aegina), Hayy Open Space and Sezon (İzmir) and Art Unlimited (İstanbul), events were held in İstanbul and İzmir, with a particular focus on the Aegean coast, which is a threshold for migration.

A total of 173 people physically participated in the events held as part of the project, while a total of 28,130 people were reached through online publications and social media posts.

This documentary journey takes place on a 23,800-kilometre route covering 7 countries and 62 cities, and the production process is still underway.



As part of the project carried out by BAU MEDAM in 2022-23, Anaia Archaeological Site (Kadıkalesi, Kuşadası - Aydın) was digitised via augmented reality (AR), virtual reality (VR) and 3D video simulation technologies.

In the first phase of the project carried out in cooperation with the UK-based We Are Immersive Ltd., a 5,000 square metre portion of the site was mapped by means of the three-dimensional scanning technology.

In the second phase of the project, the potential of these technologies in cultural heritage areas was presented to academics and students through an online conference held by Bahçeşehir University Faculty of Architecture and Design based in İstanbul.

The online events and VR content developed under the project were visited by approximately 2,500 people during the project.

This project aims to emphasise that creativity is a form of expression independent of geographical and social boundaries and to provide an empowering space for young women.

Example of an International Collaboration

In 2021, the Pan~//Catwalk project, carried out with the Dutch team Zwermers, was staged in Istanbul as a performance built on social norms and visibility. Bilgi University students voluntarily participated in the pop-up performances in public spaces such as Kadıköy Mehmet Ayvalıtaş Park and Museum Gazhane. The new edition of the performance in İzmir was staged in collaboration with students from Dokuz Eylül and Ege Universities and PAL İzmir. The project presented a multi-layered example of international co-operation in which young artists were actively involved in the creative production process.



Nutcrusher was an impressive dance performance by South Korean artist Sung-Im Her that questions themes of gender and power relations.

The performance met with an audience of 375 people at Alan Kadıköy in İstanbul on 5-6 June 2023. In addition to the performance, the artist held a physical workshop called 'Moving Cloud'.

The festival also involved an online panel titled '#MeToo Experiences from Around the World in Performing Arts' on 21 July 2023. Sung-Im Her and Ezgi Sözmen from #SusmaBitsin took part in the panel. The panel's footage was published on Fringe İstanbul's YouTube channel.

The Foundation also supports contemporary culture and arts production through the awards it presents at its festivals, commissions, local and international co-productions, a residency programme at the Cité Internationale des Arts artists' workshop in France, the İKSV 50th Anniversary Young Artists Fund, as well as the Aydın Gün Incentive Award, the Talât Sait Halman Translation Award, and the Gülriz Sururi-Engin Cezzar Theatre Incentive Award.

Example of an International Collaboration

IKSV Alt Kat, which carries out its activities under IKSV's Cultural Policy Studies, organised a choir workshop as part of the WOW International Women's Festival Istanbul, supporting the empowerment of young women through artistic expression. Led by Başak Doğan, Founding Conductor of Chromas and Vocal Academy, 'The Voice of Young Women: Polyphonic Choir Workshop' brought together 30 participants aged 18-23. The workshop series, held between 6 and 29 February 2024, focused on improvisation techniques based on the Vocal Painting method. offering the opportunity to experience collective musical production, versatile use of the voice, and non-verbal forms of communication. The participants staged the repertoire they had learned in the WOW World Women's Festival Istanbul, which took place on 3 March 2024 at Beykoz Kundura.

Implemented in collaboration with İKSV Alt Kat, Vokal Akademi and Stop Ecocide International, 'Eco Melodies: Music for Ecology' project aimed to make the themes of environmental awareness and sustainability visible through music.

The workshop programme was conducted within the framework of a special repertoire of works by international composers, and included 30 participants. Participants worked on polyphonic music techniques and generated musical productions with environmental themes.

The concert, which was the output of the project, was performed on 9 February 2025 at Cemal Reşit Rey Concert Hall in İstanbul.

Two-thirds of visitors are from Turkey, while the rest are international visitors. Access for young people and individuals from different socio-economic backgrounds has been increased through initiatives such as free admission on Tuesdays and Thursdays. To date, more than one million children, young people and adults have participated in the museum's educational programmes free of charge.

Example of an International Collaboration

Istanbul Modern launched its International Artist-in-Residence Programme in 2018, adopting a production-oriented approach and hosting artists from different regions in Istanbul. This programme offers artists the opportunity to discover İstanbul's multifaceted cultural fabric, while also inviting them to explore the city's ever-changing layers. Participating artists create artworks that will be featured in the museum's exhibitions and programmes, focusing on the city's tangible and intangible cultural heritage and contemporary life. Additionally, the 'Museum' Talk' programme, launched in 2012, facilitates collaborations with international organisations and agencies, in addition to organising exhibitions and events.

Istanbul Modern's International Artist-in-Residence Programme was relaunched in 2024 with a grant from the British Council's Grant Programme for Creative Collaborations.

The guest of the 2024 programme was composer Dimitris Skyllas from the United Kingdom. During his time in İstanbul, Skyllas researched both the city and the museum's architecture and collection, visiting places that reflect the soundscapes of İstanbul.

The musical work created by the artist, inspired by his research, is presented at Istanbul Modern on 12 September 2025.

KUAR contributed to the circular economy-based maker movement conducted in seven European cities in the Pop-Machina project. In the project, which aimed to involve local communities in production in the cities of İstanbul, Leuven, Thessaloniki, Kaunas, Venlo, Piraeus and Santander, KUAR faculty members served as pilot implementation leaders. In this process, workshops, field research and design guides were developed, bringing together maker culture and creative production. The project was successfully completed in February 2024.

Grant Project Details

In the project, KUAR created a creative network with the theme of sustainability in cooperation with Lancaster University. In the first phase, artists and designers in İstanbul and Lancaster came together in face-to-face in Lanchester and in online meetings; in the second phase, a joint design fiction workshop was held in 2023-2024. In the final phase, the outputs of these collaborations were exhibited at both Koç University in İstanbul and Lancaster University. Accessibility principles were observed in the events, and bilingual communication was provided with Turkish and English content.

Example of an International Collaboration

'Rebuilding Beyond Bricks – Creative Music Workshops' project by MİRAS supported by SEMPRE (The Society for Education, Music and Psychology Research). This initiative was carried out in Hatay, one of the most severely affected regions by the 2023 earthquakes. Through a series of creative workshops, both Turkish and international musicians—including Evrencan Gündüz, Tolgahan Çoğulu, and Audrey Wozniak—worked with children and young people to support emotional healing and creative expression. The workshops aimed to help participants reconnect with their sense of agency and community through music, improvisation, and play.



Phoenix Project is a multidisciplinary and international initiative realised by MİRAS with the support of the British Council's 2024–2025 Creative Collaborations Grant Programme. Co-created by artists from Türkiye and the UK, the project aimed to highlight Hatay's multicultural heritage and its determination to rebuild, using music as a powerful medium of expression. As part of the project, a panel was held at Salon IKSV on 2 May 2025, where the creative process and international collaboration model were shared. On 9 May 2025, the project culminated in a large-scale performance at the Hatay Culture and Arts Market, attracting an audience of over 500 people. In addition, the artists held creative music workshops in local schools, directly reaching approximately 30 children and young people. The project positions cultural production as a tool for collective healing and community resilience.

Onagöre accomplished the Turkish adaptation of the project 'The Price of Everything' together with the UK-based art collective Quarantine. Shaped with the contributions of Prof. Zafer Yenal and Mısra Şen, this project was built around the experience of a meaningful conversation at the dinner table. The menu of questions and topics created with local hosts in İstanbul aimed to offer different perspectives to the participants, creating an intellectual ground on social interaction, in February 2024.

The 'BACI' Contemporary Ethnic Dance project was held in collaboration with Ege University Turkish Folk Dance Department and Ceyda Tanc Dance Company from the United Kingdom. The project focused on the themes of gender inequality, migration, and women's resilience, bringing together Turkish folk dances and contemporary dance. The performance staged by Turkish and British dancers reinterpreted the motifs of traditional folk dances with contemporary choreography, bringing cultural dances to a different narrative plane. The performances were held at Ege University Campus Cultural Centre (approximately 700 people) and İzmir Ahmed Adnan Saygun Art Centre (approximately 1,200 people) on 24 February 2024.

The project aimed to build bridges between Eastern and Western dance aesthetics through interdisciplinary dance production.



Example of an International Collaboration

The project titled 'Soundcheck!' was carried out in cooperation with London-based Resonance FM and Gaziantep/Paris-based Radio Rozana. As part of the project, Syrian music professionals living in Türkiye and a Spanish researcher prepared a series of podcasts/radio broadcasts moderated by Donald Hyslop. The broadcasts explored the themes of migration, music and social memory, and two special programmes on the February earthquakes were also produced. The broadcasts reached more than 100,000 people online. The project aimed to make the cultural contributions of Syrians visible and provide a positive perspective on refugee representation.



Throughout the broadcast series Soundcheck!, cultural content was produced, presented in accessible radio format and international collaborations were established.

The technical infrastructure of the project was undertaken by Rozana FM and Resonance FM. As a result of online interviews, recordings and editing, a multilingual and polyphonic broadcast archive was created and broadcasted between December 2023 to January 2024.
